Introduction

Women are particularly vulnerable to the economic and social impacts of the pandemic. This is due to the likelihood of them working on the frontline as keyworkers and the additional pressures of children's learning and other caring responsibilities.

Introduction

Disabled women are at a higher risk of poverty, insecure and low paid employment and domestic violence compared to non-disabled women.

This morning we will look at the impact of Covid on:

In research conducted by the Fawcett Society in 2020, the impact of Covid 19 on women was explored and the following are some of the findings from their research.



Financial Inclusion

Lockdown and the closing down of many sectors has had a disproportionate impact on women.

42.9% of BME women believed that they would come out of the Coronavirus outbreak in more debt than before. This is compared to **37.1%** of White women and **34.3%** for White men. In terms of disabled women this figure was **43%**.



Financial Inclusion

42.6% of BME women and **37.9%** of White women felt that they would struggle to make ends meet in the next three months. The figure for White men was **33.5%**. The figure for disabled women is **40.7%**



Caring Responsibilities

Women reported doing the majority of the housework regardless of ethnicity.

• 72.6% of BME women and 74.4% of White women stated that they were doing the majority of household tasks such as cleaning and cooking. This figure compares to 52.4% of White men. The figure for disabled women was 68%.



Caring Responsibilities

74% of BME women and 72.8% of White women were looking after their children, compared to 46.1% of White men. The figure for disabled women was 72.8%.

• 56.9% of BME women and 52.2% of White women said that they were struggling to balance paid work and caring for their children. This compares to a figure of 34.2% of white men. The figure for disabled women is 59.6%.



Caring Responsibilities

• 56.7% of BME women and 50.5% of White women were struggling to cope with all of the different demands on their time, compared to 37.1% of White males. The figure for disabled women is 63%.



Access to Support

Being able to access financial, practical and emotional support is vital, especially during periods of lockdown

42.5% of BME women and 12.7% of White women stated that they had lost support from the government. This compares to 20.6% of White men. The figure for disabled women was 20%



Access to Support

- 48.3% of BME women and 34% of White women lost support from other people. This compares to 27.5% of White men. For disabled women this figure was 42.9%
- 51.4% of BME women and 18.7% of White women were not sure where to turn to for help. This compares to 24.7% of White men. The figure for disabled women was 32.3%.



Access to Support

47.4% of BME women and 57.2% of White women felt that there were people outside of their households that they could rely on for help.
 This compares to 56.3% of White men.



Access to Healthcare

69.7% of BME women and 62.5% of White women were worried that, should they need it for reasons other than Coronavirus, they might not be able to get NHS Treatment. This compares to 51.2% of White men. The figure for disabled women is 66.4%

49.8% of BME women and 45.2% of White women were worried that they would not be able to access medication that they need. This compares to 39.6% of White men. The figure for disabled women is 60.6%.



LGBTQ Communities

42% would like to access support for their mental health at this time.

This rises to 66% of BME LGBT people, 48% of disabled LGBT people,

57% of trans people and **60%** of non-binary people.

LGBTQ Communities

8% do not feel safe where they are currently staying

This includes **9%** of BME LGBT people, **15%** of disabled LGBT people,

17% of trans people and 17% of non-binary people.



LGBTQ Communities

16% had been unable to access healthcare for non-Covid related issues

This rises to 22% of BME LGBT people, 26% of disabled LGBT people,

27% of trans people, 27% of non-binary people, and 18% of LGBT people aged 50+.



West Midlands

Survey data published by West Midland's Women's Voice

- Four in ten women in the West Midlands
 (37%) say their mental health has got worse since the Covid-19 pandemic started.
- Almost half of women in the West Midlands
 (47%) have considered retraining into health and social care during Covid-19.



West Midlands

Three in ten women in the West Midlands (27%) say that they are 'struggling or worse off' financially, compared with 16% before the crisis.

 A fifth of women in the West Midlands (20%) said their employability had worsened.



West Midlands

Impacts have differed by ethnicity - in the West Midlands, 13% of employed Black, and minority ethnicity (BME) women have seen their pay change compared with 5% of white women. A fifth of women in the West Midlands (21%) have been furloughed.



EQuIP – Issues Reported

- Older BME women are more isolated and lonely than before the pandemic
- Women who are furloughed are having to rely on their partners for income support
- Older women are more likely to struggle to find employment



EQuIP – Casework

Hate Crime/Incident 38% men and 62% women

Discrimination 31% men and 69% women
